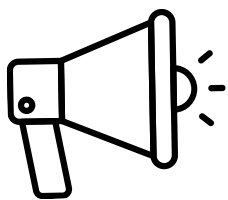

### New Substantive Principal

### CSEF (Camps, Sports, and Excursions Fund) Funding Reminder:

2025 Applications for CSEF close on July 4, if you are a holder of a Health Care Card, your child may be eligible for CSEF Funding. Eligible Primary students receive \$154 and Secondary students \$256. The CSEF provides payments to assist eligible families to cover the costs of camps, sporting activities, excursions and incursions. Payments are made directly to an eligible student's school. Schools must use a CSEF payment only for the eligible student or for that student's siblings. If you have a current Health Care Card, please provide a copy to the Front Office or contact them on (03 5070 2106) no later than the July 1 to allow time to process.

### Winter Uniform

As the weather changes, some students have been arriving at school out of uniform. Tyrrell College jackets and rugby jumpers are available for purchase at Clark's Gift Salon in Swan Hill. The College also has beanies available for \$11.50 from the general office. If you still have funds remaining from the School Saving Bonus, you can use them to purchase uniform items. # HUMANITIES Year 7



## ***The Mummification Process- By Charlotte Gallagher***

Before we wrapped up Arli and Max, we learned about the mummification process. After the person has died, the body is taken across the Nile River to the 'ibu', a place of purification. There the embalmers wash the body with nice-smelling palm wine and rinse it with water from the Nile mixed with natron salt. One of the embalmers would then make a cut in the left side of the body, where they remove many of the internal organs. It was important to remove them because they would be the first part of the body to decompose.

The lungs, liver, intestines and stomach are packed with natron salt, which dries out the organs. The heart would not be removed because the Ancient Egyptians believed that the dead person would need it for the afterlife, and that it was the centre of intelligence and feeling. A long hook is then pushed up one of the person's nostrils and swirled around to smash up the brains, and pulled out to be thrown away.

The body was then stuffed with natron to dry it out, and after forty days, it was washed again with water from the Nile. Then it was covered with oils to keep the skin soft and stretchy.

The dehydrated internal organs were then wrapped in and placed in canopic jars. The body was then stuffed with sawdust and straw, so that it looks lifelike. Finally, the body is washed once more with nice-smelling oils.

The body was then wrapped in linen cloth, a mask is placed on their head, and buried in a special stone coffin called a sarcophagus, with spell scrolls and amulets to aid the soul on the journey to the afterlife. At last, the body is placed in the tomb within the pyramid and mourned properly.

When we wrapped our two classmates, we used rolls of toilet paper, and there was a competition between the girls and the boys.

The girls did a better job at wrapping, but the boys got a head start at explaining the process. Arli was wrapped almost perfectly, with her nose and mouth left exposed, her limbs all tied together, and a beautifully done pharaoh mask atop her face.

The boys were a bit sloppy with their wrapping, and a bit silly, as well. Both Max and Arli had a fun time breaking out of the toilet paper.

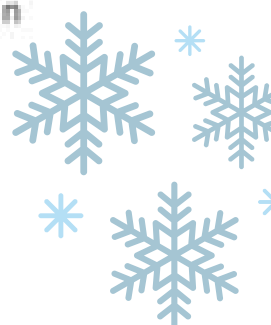
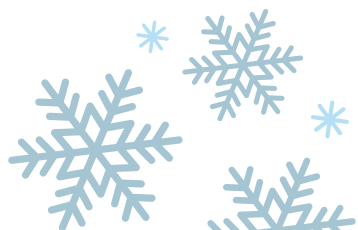
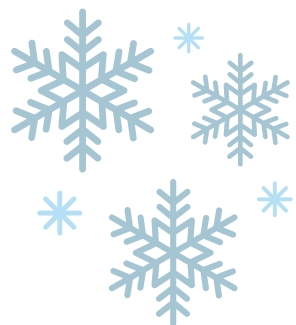
